Originally built as a grand retreat by Edward and Marie Knight, Whalehead was ahead of its time,

boasting modern luxuries like electricity and indoor plumbing. Over the years, it has become a cherished piece of Corolla's history, captivating visitors with its stunning architecture, rich stories and breathtaking views.

Sanctuary Vineyards

Historic Jarvisburg Colored School

The Historic Jarvisburg Colored School is a powerful symbol of resilience and education during the segregation era. Built in 1867, it stands as one of North Carolina's oldest African American schools and now serves as a museum. Through exhibits and personal stories, visitors can reflect on its role as a cornerstone of the local African American community for nearly a century. This is also part of the African American Experience of Northeastern North Carolina.



Mackay Island National Wildlife Refuge

Accessible by ferry or scenic drive, **Mackay Island National Wildlife Refuge** offer a tranquil retreat into nature. Spanning over 8,200 acres of marshlands, forests and waterways, this refuge is a haven for waterfowl, deer and migratory birds. Whether hiking, kayaking, fishing, or birdwatching, visitors are surrounded by the stunning landscapes that define The Northern Outer Banks.

Buffalo City Distillery

Located on The Mainland of The Northern Outer Banks, **Buffalo City Distillery** honors the area's Prohibition-era heritage in a modern state-of-the-art facility by providing premium farm-to-bottle spirits and exceptional visitor experiences including tastings, tours and live music events.



Whalehead in Historic Corolla

Step into the elegance of the 1920s at **Whalehead in Historic Corolla**, a breathtaking Art Nouveau
masterpiece nestled in the heart of Historic Corolla
Park. This 21,000-square-foot "mansion by the sea,"
built by Edward Collins Knight Jr. for his wife Marie,
offers a glimpse into a bygone era of opulence and
adventure. Daily tours and exhibits reveal the Knights'
passion for waterfowl hunting and the storied past of
this architectural treasure.



The Currituck Beach Lighthouse

Rising 162 feet above Corolla, the **Currituck Beach Lighthouse** is a stunning symbol of the Outer Banks' maritime heritage. Built in 1875, this red-brick icon stands unpainted, showcasing its original craftsmanship. Climb the 220 steps to the top for sweeping views of the Atlantic Ocean and Currituck Sound, offering a breathtaking experience that connects you with the history and beauty of The Northern Outer Banks.

Historic Corolla Village

Wander through **Historic Corolla Village**, where preserved buildings and coastal charm create a serene journey into the past. Explore quaint shops, local galleries and museums that celebrate the area's rich history and cultural heritage. This nostalgic escape is a quiet reminder of The Northern Outer Banks' timeless allure.

Corolla Wild Horses

In the northern reaches of The Northern Outer Banks, the legendary **Corolla Wild Horses** roam free along the windswept beaches of the 7,000-acre **Currituck**National Wildlife Refuge. Accessible only by four-wheel-drive vehicles, these majestic horses, descendants of the Spanish Colonial Mustang, have grazed and galloped here for nearly five centuries. Their untamed beauty adds to the awe-inspiring charm of this pristine coastal landscape.






Northern Outer Banks Fast Facts

THE MAINLAND, THE BEACHES, KNOTTS ISLAND



The Northern Outer Banks consist of three destinations or regions within Currituck County, North Carolina. On the sandbar between the Currituck Sound and the Atlantic Ocean are the beaches of Corolla and Carova. To the west of the Currituck Sound is a more rural farming community known as The Mainland and located to the North and accessible only from Currituck County by Ferry is Knotts Island, a historical wildfowl hunting community with a wintering bird sanctuary known as Mackay Island.
